2022 DOG LICENSES

It is time to license your dog(s). The deadline is April 1st. The cost is \$9.00 for a neutered dog and \$13.00 for an unneutered dog. After April 1st the cost will be \$11.00 for a neutered dog and \$17.00 for an unneutered dog.

It is the law of the State of Vermont to license dogs annually. Owners of unlicensed dogs can be fined up to \$500 and/or the dog(s) could be impounded and destroyed.

It is the law of the State of Vermont that all dogs are vaccinated every three years. The first vaccination is only good for one year.

TAXES

The next property tax installment is due on May 13, 2022. The office will be open until 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The Town accepts postmarked envelopes.

SUMMER HOURS

Summer hours will begin onMay 6. The Town Office will close at noon on Fridays (except for the day property taxes are due). Summer hours will end the last Friday of September.

TOWN PLAN

Roxbury's Town Plan has been approved. The Roxbury Planning Commissioners have worked very hard to create the new plan. Roxbury citizens are lucky to have Lucinda Sullivan, Dotti Guiffre, Elizabeth Carney and Mike French.

SIDEWALK SCOPING STUDY GRANT

The Town of Roxbury received a grant for a sidewalk scoping study in the village. An engineering firm was hired (Hoyle, Tanner & Associates). Hoyle, Tanner & Associates presented four options for the Town to consider at a meeting on March 23rd. Three of those options would help with drainage in the village and crosswalks would be installed. The current sidewalk

is not in good shape (it has a lot of issues). The proposed sidewalk would go from the southern entrance of Windridge Camp at Teela-Wooket to the Fire Station.

SELECTBOARD MEETINGS

Roxbury Selectboard Meeting Minutes are posted on the Town's website, www.roxburyvt.org. If you are unable to attend meetings, you can keep up with what is happening in your town by reading the minutes.

The Roxbury Selectboard temporarily put the Ordinance Regulating the Disposal of Solid Waste and the Outdoor Storage of Junk and Junk Vehicles on hold until COVID case numbers lowered.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

The Town received \$105,969.28 in ARPA funds. At the Board meetings, the Selectboard have been discussing what the funds can be used on. (There are strict rules on what these funds can be used on.) The Town should receive additional ARPA funds this year. One item the Board has been discussing using some of the funds to get better internet to Roxbury citizens.

2012 FORD TRUCK

The Selectboard sold the 2012 Ford One Ton via Auctions International. The high bid was \$7,100.00. Those funds were deposited into the Highway Equipment Reserve Fund.

GREEN MOUNTAIN PASSPORT PROGRAM

The Green Mountain Passport Program allows free day-use passes to Vermont State Parks and historic sites. If you are a Vermont resident at least 62 years of age or a Vermont veteran of the uniformed services you are eligible. To enroll in the program, you must complete an application at your Town Clerk's Office and pay a one-time fee of \$2. You will then receive a Green Mountain Passport card which is good for life and is not transferable. For more information contact the Town Clerk's Office at 485-7840 or stop by.

Newsy Update (April - June 2022)

We would like to thank Roxbury for your endorsement of the school budget.

Mask Transition

On March 14th, Montpelier Roxbury Public Schools (MRPS) suspended the recommendation that all students and staff mask when at school based on the shift in guidance from the Vermont Department of Public Health. This transition has been in process at the Montpelier schools because vaccination rates have determined masking recommendations. Masking is a very personal decision every family must make. We respect each family's decisions about masking. As masking decreases we are excited to see more smiling faces!

Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds

As we slowly emerge from two years of a global pandemic, we recognize challenges our students currently face with respect to social emotional learning and mental health, as well as learning loss. A third round of federal ESSER funds are being used to meet those challenges.

Based on administrator insights and feedback from the community, these ESSER funds will be used in five broad categories:

- 1. Infrastructure spending to improve spaces in Union Elementary School, Main Street Middle School, and Montpelier High School. A special education suite will be constructed at Union Elementary School. The largest projects will be at MSMS, where the playground and the cafeteria/kitchen will see significant improvements. An apartment space will be constructed at MHS to help kids who need support building life skills.
- 2. Enhanced Social Emotional Learning throughout the district. A certified behavioral support teacher will be added to the district. A guidance counselor will be added at UES. Social Emotional Learning teachers will be added at UES and MSMS. ESSER funds will be used to fund a district-wide administrator who will help orchestrate a program to support social emotional learning for years to come. Nick Conner has also been filling an important role, reaching out to families in the role of community liaison to determine what assistance, if any, families might need to ensure students are engaged with the schools. The role of community liaison will continue in the local budget and we appreciate Nick's work for the district.

- 3. Improved Special Education services. Physical spaces will be improved as described above. Social Emotional Learning teachers will also support Special Education services.
- 4. Educational interventionists will provide remediation in literacy and math where needed. Four interventionist positions will be added, bringing the total number of interventionists to nine. These positions will provide academic support in all four schools.
- 5. A Summer Programming fund will support unique enrichment activities for MRPS students over the summer.

Administration News

There is a lot of change afoot within the MRPS administration. MHS welcomes Jason Gringold as the incoming principal for school year '22-'23. Katie Barea, Main Street Middle School's current principal, will become Union Elementary School's new principal in the upcoming year. The interview process is underway for MSMS principal, as well as the Director of Student Support and new district-wide Director of Social Emotional Learning and Wellness. Additionally, the MRPS district has a new incoming Business Manager, Christina Kimball. We would like to express our appreciation for Beth Kellogg's continued leadership at RVS amid what will surely be a rebuilding year within the leadership team of the district. We would like to recognize and appreciate the MRPS Business Manager, Grant Geisler, for his work orchestrating and communicating the district budget for the last eight years. He has helped the district grow our ability to support our staff and our students while carefully safeguarding MRPS citizen tax rates. The formula the state of Vermont uses to finance our schools is complicated. We will miss Grant's ability to communicate difficult concepts when he retires this spring.

District Visioning Process

Since the 2018 merger, the communities of Roxbury and Montpelier have not yet come together to develop a guiding vision for education within our district. A committee has been established to do this work with the assistance of Montpelier based BUILD Strategies Consulting. MRPS wants to hear from you about your vision of excellence in education. We want to know the values you hope will guide the school board, administration, and educators in planning and decision making for the future. Roxbury community members Rhett Williams, Amirah Lewis (MRPS student), and Dotti Guiffre are committee members, and hope to hear from as many Roxburians and Montpelierites as they possibly can. Montpelier and Roxbury are not the same. It is important that Roxbury folks contribute their voices when it comes to our hopes for all of our kids. We will be making efforts to speak to you, and will encourage you to complete a survey to share your perspectives.

We encourage you to reach out to us should you have any questions, concerns, or appreciations around the school district.

Field Naturalist's Corner

Killdeer (Charadrius vociferus) are a type of shorebird that lives in fields and wide open areas. In Vermont, Killdeer begin courtship, breeding, and nest building in April. These nests are remarkably sparse—usually just a depression on the ground where the female lays three to five brownspeckled gray eggs. These speckles provide camouflage in such an exposed nest, and as incubation progresses, the parents line the nest with light colored insulating materials, also thought to hide the eggs from view. The chicks that hatch after



24-28 days are precocial, which means that they are covered in down and capable of running as soon as their down dries from hatching. To protect their offspring, the parents will feign injury as

soon as a potential threat approaches, attempting to lead the predator away from their chicks. The most well-known of these displays is the "broken wing" display. The parent will fly twenty feet or so, making an alarm call and spreading its wings and tail so that they droop or the ground, moving a few feet at a time away from the chicks. With luck, the predator will follow the distractive display until the parent suddenly flies back to its chicks, leaving the predator at a safe distance.

Roxbury Park Development Committee

The Roxbury Park Development Committee is continuing its work focusing on:

- 1. The removal of the large maple tree which was found to be in an unsafe stage of decay.
- 2. Installation of an accessible walkway through the park.
- Acquisition of grant monies for purchase of benches, picnic tables, a Ping-Pong table, bike racks, and a gazebo.

The committee has been meeting with a group of Norwich University senior engineering students and their professor, Adam Sevi (a Roxbury native). The students prepared a presentation detailing the development of the park and its associated costs, which they will present as a Capstone project at Norwich University in late April.

The Park Development Committee members are Edward Carney, Chair; Craig Sullivan, Dotti Guiffre, Jim Rogler, and Elizabeth Carney. The committee welcomes public attendance to its meetings, held at the Community Center, with dates and times announced on the Roxbury Town Website.

Although the Park is owned by the Town of Roxbury, the funding of projects for development of the Park relies on grants and private donations. Donations can be made to the Park Development Fund via the Town of Roxbury.

A Message of Thanks from the RVFD

The Roxbury Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD) thanks Roxbury voters for their support of the department's 2022-23 budget and article on the vehicle replacement fund.

Reminders on Open Outdoor Burning

Now that snow has melted and spring yard cleanup is underway, the Roxbury Forest Fire Warden reminds property owners that permits are required for open outdoor burning. Permits are available by phone from Tim Martin, Forest Fire Warden (802-485-6555); or Don Randall, alternate (802-485-8341). Permits are granted if conditions are safe for outdoor burning according to a daily posting for each region by the Vermont Department of Forests and Parks. In addition, each permit is reported to the Central Vermont Mutual Aid System to avoid responses to false alarms.

Materials that may be burned include leaves, brush, weeds, untreated lumber, and clean wood pallets. It is against the law to have in an outdoor open burn pile: paper/cardboard; tires and other rubber products; plywood, treated, painted, or finished wood; tarpaper and asphalt shingles; asbestos; waste oil; plastics, and garbage.


Safety reminders include clearing a buffer around the burn pile to prevent the fire from spreading, having a water supply on hand, attending the fire at all times, dousing the fire and turning over ashes several times before leaving the site, and checking the burn area to be sure the fire is completely extinguished.

Outdoor burning should not create a public or private nuisance. Please be considerate of neighbors when planning to do open outdoor burning. Thank you!

Best Marinade Ever, for (hicken or Tofu

by Lise Cloutier, kitchen manager of the East Warren Market "Use maple syrup, I think that's appropriate for this time of year!"

Ingredients

Enough for 8 chicken thighs or equivalent *I've used the same recipe with tofu and it is delicious.*

Maple Syrup – 2 tbsp
Grainy Mustard – 2 tbsp
Soy Sauce – 2 tbsp
Coriander (Cilantro) stems – 4 tbsp finely chopped
Orange Marmalade (with the rind) – 1 tsp
Coriander Powder – 2 tsp
Ginger (finely chopped) – 2 tsp
Salt – to taste

- 1. Whisk the ingredients together
- 2. Scoop over the meat or tofu, and marinate for 1-2 hours.
- 3. This is quite a dry marinade and there may be a need to rub it in to make sure the meat is covered completely.

 4. Pan-grill or BBQ the meat afterwards. You need very little oil.
